Our society says at death you either cease to be or you go to a better place.

Christianity places its hope in the <u>resurrection</u> of the <u>body</u>.

RESURRECTION - Greek *anastasis*; to raise up, awaken, or repair; implies a change in status, usually for the better

What happens when we die? (2 Cor. 5:8; Luke 23:43; John 14:2-3; Rev. 21)

• First, there is death and whatever <u>immediately</u> lies beyond (rest and joy in God's presence). Second, we look <u>ahead</u> to resurrection and a new bodily existence in a newly remade world.

How are the dead raised? (1 Cor. 15:57; Rom. 8:11)

Resurrection depends wholly on the power of God.

What will the resurrected body be like? (1 Cor. 15:36-37, 42-44)

- Your present body is to your resurrected body as a <u>seed</u> is to the <u>plant</u> that grows from it. It is a <u>transformation</u> to a higher form of embodied life, unquenchable and unending.
- Look at <u>Jesus</u> after his resurrection. (Luke 24; Matthew 28)

What hope do we have in the face of death? (1 Cor. 15:54-58)

- Jesus has gone <u>ahead</u> and removed death's <u>sting</u>.
- In Christ, death is not the end of family and community.
- Jesus' resurrection means <u>infinite</u> hope and reason to pour ourselves out for the needs of the world and to work against the forces of <u>death</u>.
